FLEA AND WORMING TREATMENTS


All cats are at risk of getting fleas and worms. Cats that hunt are at particular risk, but even indoor cats suffer too. That's why it's important that you regularly treat your cat for both.

There are two main types of worm that affect cats – roundworms and tapeworms. Roundworms are very common in kittens whilst tapeworms are usually only found in adult cats. Some worming treatments work for both roundworm and tapeworm, but others are only effective against one or the other. It's important to choose the right product for your cat.

Cats will not necessarily show signs of having worms but worms can cause weight loss, vomiting and diarrhoea. Cats can pick up worms from other animals or from eating the larvae or eggs of worms.

Outdoor cats are more prone to getting worms but even indoor cats can become infected through fleas or worm eggs brought into the house on shoes or clothes.

Fleas are the other area of cat health hygiene that needs regular attention. Not only will fleas cause your cat a lot of discomfort but they can also transmit tapeworms. Whilst cat fleas can't live on humans they can bite and in some cases, the reaction can be unpleasant.

 **Be aware!**

NEVER use a flea product on a cat that has been formulated for use on a dog – some of these contain ingredients that can cause serious harm to cats.



The flea lifecycle: The female will lay its eggs on your cat. The eggs then fall off around the home. Depending on conditions, they can take anywhere from 2 days to 2 weeks to hatch as larvae. The larvae will then develop in pupae encased in cocoons.

When ready, the adult flea will emerge from its cocoon, attracted by vibrations, carbon dioxide, and body heat from your pets. It will then jump onto your cat where it will lay its eggs, restarting the whole process.

This indicates the importance of regular flea treatment.

Removing fleas from your cat is one thing, but they will become reinfected from fleas in the house.

Regular treatment gives you the best chance of removing new fleas from your cat before they get the chance to lay eggs and start the whole cycle again.

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WHEN DOES YOUR CAT NEED A TRIP TO THE VET?

After the initial round of kitten vaccinations, a first booster should be given 12 months later to ensure a good level of continued protection.

After that, the frequency of booster vaccinations may depend on the vaccine, disease and potential risk to your cat but are generally every 1-3 years. Your vet will advise accordingly.

If you are planning to put your cat in a boarding cattery at any time, it will require an annual or booster vaccination beforehand as there is an increased risk of infection. Many catteries make this stipulation for the benefit of your own and other cat residents.

As well as trips to the vets for vaccinations, it is important to take your cat to the vet for regular check ups. Cats are masters at hiding pain and discomfort as part of their survival mechanism.

This makes it much harder for us to spot if they are suffering.

Many conditions that affect cats in later life start in middle age and these regular check-ups can help, making them easier and cheaper to address.

At these check ups, your vet will assess the ongoing overall health and well-being of your cat, with a routine check of alertness, appearance, weight, muscle condition, heart rate, respiratory function and lymph activity being standard tests your vet will make.

BODY CONDITION SCORING

Weight gain doesn't happen overnight – it gradually creeps on. Regular weight checks of your cat are vital to help spot this.

It is estimated that 40% to 50% of cats are overweight. Being overweight can lead to diabetes, lower urinary tract disease (cystitis, etc), skin diseases, hepatic lipidosis (commonly known as fatty liver disease), decreased stamina and willingness to exercise, and joint problems including osteoarthritis.

The best advice is to avoid letting a cat become overweight at all.

If a cat is overweight crash diets are not the answer. It is dangerous for cats to lose weight too quickly as this can cause the potentially fatal disease of hepatic lipidosis. Aim for a gradual, steady decrease in bodyweight instead. SPECIFIC™ have a range of diets designed to help you.

 **How to check your cat's weight**

To measure Body Condition Score – look at your cat from above and from the side.

You may also want to feel along the sides with a firm stroke – you should be able to feel their ribs but with a layer of fat over them. You should be able to feel, but not see, the ribs and spine. From above, you should see a waist. And from the side, you should see the abdomen raised.



HOW TO WEIGH YOUR CAT

A simple way to do this is to weigh yourself, then weigh yourself while holding your cat then subtract the first from the second number, leaving the weight of your cat. By monitoring your cat's weight and keeping a record of the amount fed, it is much easier to spot weight gain or loss and adjust feeding amounts.

NUTRITION TO HELP WITH BLADDER STONES AND URINARY TRACT HEALTH

Urine carries away water, dissolved protein waste and excess minerals. When there are more waste materials than can be dissolved, then stones can form in the bladder. These stones can block the urine and waste elements in the bladder, with the potential for serious harm, whilst the tension in the bladder causes pain.

How can better nutrition help?

- + By reducing the amount of mineral and protein waste – giving less material for stones to form
- + By changing the acidity of urine, helping to dissolve stones whilst preventing other stones from re-forming
- + By encouraging drinking to increase urination and help flush out waste

In the case of the most common stone – struvite – the correct diet can actually dissolve the stones, helping avoid unnecessary surgical treatments.

Once dissolved, diet can then help prevent the recurrence of stones re-forming. In the cases of calcium-oxalate, urate and cystine stones, these will need to be removed surgically, but once removed, a proper diet can help prevent their recurrence.

Another common problem in cats is idiopathic cystitis, a disease of the lower urinary tract without any obvious causes – such as bacteria or urinary stones. Ideally cats with this disease should be fed a wet diet to increase fluid intake.

NUTRITION TO HELP WITH ALLERGIES AND SENSITIVITIES

There are different causes of sensitivities and allergies. Some are a reaction to foods and others to environmental causes such as mites, dust, pollens and moulds. Different types of allergies call for different nutritional response.

Food sensitivities

When dealing with food intolerance, look for foods with unusual proteins which your cat is unlikely to have eaten before. An ideal food has unusual proteins and limited number of ingredients, reducing the risk of giving your cat one of the problem causing ingredients.

Hydrolysis can also help

By cutting the protein molecules into very small pieces making them less likely to trigger a reaction.

Environmental allergies

Your cat's skin is the first layer of defence against allergens in the environment. A healthier skin can improve its protection. Nutrients such as Omega-3 from fish oils and vitamins and minerals including zinc, vitamin A and B-complex all help maintain a healthy skin.

Relieving the symptoms of flea bites

Omega-3 fish oils can help support the natural anti-inflammatory process in your cat and so help counteract the distressing itching.

NUTRITION TO HELP WITH DIGESTIVE PROBLEMS

There are a number of causes for digestive problems in cats including: infection, something your cat has eaten, parasites – typically worms, pancreatic diseases – where the production of food digesting enzymes is disrupted, food allergy or sensitivity.

Whatever the cause of the upset, your cat isn't getting sufficient nutrients and this needs to be addressed.

What sort of food can help?
Highly digestible ingredients allow your cat to get enough nutrients, even with their impaired digestive system.

Highly digestible foods help prevent further irritation to the stomach and leave less undigested food in the gut to feed bad bacteria.

Other ingredients such as Zeolite and yucca extract, absorb toxic components in the gut and reduce flatulence respectively.

Diets designed for digestive upset often include higher levels of vitamins and minerals to compensate for those lost through diarrhoea and vomiting. The increased levels of electrolytes, such as potassium and sodium in these diets replace these losses.

NUTRITION TO HELP WITH JOINT PROBLEMS

In a healthy body, the ends of bones are coated with protective cartilage, which is constantly broken down and rebuilt. However, if it breaks down too fast or rebuilds too slowly, then cartilage degrades allowing bones to rub together, causing pain, irritation and inflammation.

How can diet help?

Support cartilage: Omega-3 from fish oils supports the natural anti-inflammatory process and reduces the activity of cartilage degrading enzymes; glucosamine and chondroitin provide the building blocks for cartilage reconstruction.

Manganese supports the creation of new cartilage; high levels of anti-oxidants help neutralize free radicals released during inflammation, which cause further cartilage degradation.

Weight management: Excess weight is both a cause and a result of the problem. Excess weight increases the levels of cartilage degradation and then reduced mobility, caused by the pain, contributes to weight gain.

That's why our joint support diets contains moderate energy levels and L carnitine – a fat-burning amino acid derivative to help maintain ideal bodyweight.

NUTRITION TO HELP WITH KIDNEY PROBLEMS

There is no cure for kidney disease but the right diet can help to slow the decline.

Specially formulated diets with a restricted phosphorus content have proven to reduce the decline in kidney function and can prolong life expectancy of cats with kidney disease.

These diets have reduced protein levels to reduce kidney workload, and as such it is important that the proteins they do have are of excellent quality.

High levels of fish oil support heart rhythm and blood pressure – positively affecting kidney function.

Restricted sodium content supports normal blood pressure and slows decline in kidney function. Added L-Carnitine and taurine support heart muscle function, and thus the kidneys as well. Reduced copper content counterbalances the impaired copper excretion in cats with liver disease.

High levels of water-soluble vitamins and potassium compensate for the increased urinary losses caused by the diuretics used with cats with heart conditions.

NUTRITION TO HELP MAINTAIN IDEAL BODYWEIGHT

If your cat needs to lose weight there are specifically designed diets to help you achieve this easily.

Weight loss diets are carefully designed to be low in fat and high in fibre, meaning your cat can still enjoy full portions, giving them a feeling of fullness, whilst losing weight.

These diets are also high in protein, causing the loss to come from fat rather than muscle mass.

With starch for a slow glucose release and high level of fibres to slow down the release of glucose, this diet is suitable for cats with diabetes.

 **Most importantly**
– No crash diets

A sudden reduction in the amount of food can bring on a condition called hepatic lipidosis. This is a fat infiltration into the liver sometimes called fatty liver.

NUTRITION TO HELP CATS RECOVERING FROM SURGERY

If your cat is recovering from sickness or has had an operation or chemotherapy, then they are not going to feel much like eating.

To ease them back into normal life, start them with small light meals.

Recovery diets are specially formulated with highly digestible ingredients containing boosted levels of calories, protein and fat – meaning even if they eat less they still get the nutrients they need.

Cats in recovery need nutrients to support the immune system, so ours contains Omega-3 fish oils, Beta glucans and high levels of zinc, selenium and arginine. Zinc and Beta glucans also aid in wound healing.
